BIODIVERSITY PROGRAM UPDATE

As a conservancy, our environmental portfolio has become an area of focus for the board. In recent months we have registered as a conservancy with the KZN conservancies and have commenced a Biodiversity Restoration Project.











CONSERVANCY AREAS

The following Public Open Spaces and focus areas have been identified for intervention as Conservancy, and these areas are now underway.

- Avon Place Conservancy Park
- Tunbridge Conservancy Park
- Comrades Corner
- MacDonald Rd Wetland Area

Additionally, CHE has undertaken the removal and control of various invasive alien plant (IAP) species. Herbicide was applied to IAPs in December 2021 and a maintenance sweep was undertaken again this month.

AVON PLACE CONSERVANCY PARK



A bridge has been constructed over the stream utilising recycled street poles and 19mm stone. We have procured a brush cutter and the trail pathway will be cut along the contours of the Conservancy Park soon. The trail will provide access to walkers and bird watchers, and also facilitate ease of access for IAP maintenance.





TUNBRIDGE CONSERVANCY PARK

Initial clearance of very heavy invasive alien plant infestation over the full length and breadth of the park including the verges was undertaken in December 2021. As with Avon Place Conservancy Park, a bridge was constructed over the stream utilising recycled gumpoles and 19mm stone. A trail will be cut to open the park up for easy access.

Once these respective trails have been prepared, tree identification tags will be fixed to various indigenous tree species. Signage for environmental education will be instituted.

COMRADES CORNER

The Comrades corner is the western entrance point into the Cowies Hill Estate. A comprehensive invasive alien plant (IAP) removal and control sweep was carried out over the full width of the North verge up to the junction with Kloof View Road (about 400m in length). This is a healthy belt of wonderful indigenous bush and forest along the residential boundaries. In some places this belt of bush is 30m deep.

An IAP removal and control sweep was also carried out along the South verge working west to east from the pavement down to the residential boundaries and thereafter 20 to 30m deep. More than 60% of the area was extremely heavily infested with mature undesirable plants.



The IAP team also removed about 27 filled-to-capacity black refuse bags of litter were disposed of and 4 sacks of glass and cans which were recycled.

We are attempting to revive this corner, as it seems that with the location of the municipality bin collection point, that this becomes a dumping ground for refuse bags. It is our hope that we will be able to rehabilitate this area and plant a surrounding garden to make this an undesirable place to dump excess garbage bags.

MACDONALD RD WETLAND AREA

The site includes the reed filled wetland, the Berm and strips of land on both sides of Morewood Crescent. This month, MacDonald Rd wetland area was treated for IAPs.

PALMIET RIVER & TRIBUTARIES

Eradication of IAP's and clean-up of the river catchment will be done under the auspices of the Public Employment Programme (PEP) within the Palmiet River & Tributaries.

Individual members of Cowies Hill Estate have however privately commissioned the removal of undesirable plant species along the cul-de-sac end of Tunbridge Drive on the banks of the Palmiet that is heavily infested with IAP. This is the also the site where our resident bushpigs, Kevin and Frank, were caught on camera.



BEAUTIFICATION SITES

Beautification continues to occur at Gate Entrances and formal gardens.

The three beds of Agapanthus planted out on the east side of Old Main Rd between Ernest Whitcutt have been weeded and plants have rooted well. Sadly, the bed under the Ernest Whitcutt sign was decimated by municipal weed-eater contractors. Further reason for us to be working closely alongside municipality in order to ensure that we maximise our efforts.
